Bernardus is Senior Advisor to Ernst & Young, and he is currently the Chairman of the Planning Ethics Board, Indonesian Association of Urban & Regional Planners. He is the founder and initiator of the Indonesian Most Livable City Index, a bi-annual survey on the state of a livability of Indonesian cities.

In his business and professional work, Bernardus is active as advisor to investors, corporations, bilateral agencies, as well as central and local governments in Indonesia and South East Asia region on financing, infrastructure, PPP and urban projects. He currently is a Senior Advisor at Ernst & Young Infrastructure Advisory group in Indonesia and South East Asia.

His 30 years of professional experience include senior management positions with leading global companies including American Express Bank, Ernst & Young, PwC, Deloitte as well as board member for leading Indonesian listed companies Jababeka Infrastructure Tbk, Nusantara Infrastructure Tbk, Hawkins Infrastructure Int'l New Zealand among others.

He graduated from the School of Urban & Regional Planning at the Bandung Institue of Technology. He is also a Fellow at Salzburg Global Seminar, a leading globalization think tank and sits as Vice President of UN affiliated EAROPH (Eastern Region Organization for Planning and Human Settlement). Bernardus currently sits in the Advisory Board of the School of Architecture, Planning & Policy Development (SAPPK) at the Bandung Institute of Technology.

Ana Perić, architect and urban planner, is Executive Board Member of ISOCARP, and Lecturer at the Institute for Spatial and Landscape Development, the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology (ETH Zurich). Between 2008 and 2015, she was engaged as a Teaching Assistant, while in 2016 she was promoted in the scientific title Research Fellow at the Faculty of Architecture, University of Belgrade. At the same faculty, she obtained a doctorate in Urban Planning, awarded from the Belgrade Chamber of Commerce. During her education, she received a number of grants, including the Swiss Governance Excellence Scholarship.

Her research interest includes urban research methodology, transnational cooperation, collaboration in the planning process, and brownfield regeneration. As an expert team member, she has participated in several international projects on various topics: from spatial and transport development in European macro-regions to brownfield regeneration initiatives. She is the author of the monograph Brownfield Regeneration in the Danube Macro-Region: Institutional Dynamics (2014), co-editor of two books – *Ten Years of UPATs: Reflections and Results* (2015) and *CODE: ATHENS! Railway and City Development in Athens* (2016), and has also published in almost fifty peer-reviewed journals and international conference proceedings.

She is a review board member of two international journals, as well as an active member of AESOP (Association of European Schools of Planning) Young Academics, Serbian Chamber of Engineers, Belgrade Association of

Architects, and associate member of NALED (National Alliance for Local Economic Development) – a Serbian NGO supported by USAID. She has been actively engaged as a member of supervising committees in a number of PhD dissertations, MAS (Master of Advanced Studies) and Master's theses being conducted at European universities (ETH Zurich, UPC Barcelona).
