Join us at the Frontiers of Planning Practice

The world’s planners are working on every kind of urban challenge, in every kind of city and region. In 2013, ISOCARP’s World Planning Congress asks:

What is effective planning practice at the global frontiers, whether planning for the local community, or mature metro, or mega-city, or vast urbanizing region?

We invite authors and delegates to consider this vital question in the context of four distinct arenas in which planning practice is evolving around the world, delivering successes on the ground, and lessons for planners everywhere.

The new world of planning practice

Given rapid urbanisation, economic uncertainties, and competing values, physical design models are not enough. Planning practice must be augmented or re-shaped through new thinking and new planning approaches to achieve sustainable outcomes. New styles of planning practice will build on past successes, if planners can find better ways of applying what they already know.

Migration as the new face of change

Migration is a fundamental force in urbanisation and is likely to increase. Population movements take many forms: shrinking cities left behind when people move to urban agglomerations; permanent movements of economic migrants; massive shifts of people serving seasonal or tourist industries; temporary migrants to resource-rich regions; flows of rich opportunists and flows of desperate refugees. This calls for new ways of thinking and new models of planning practice in response to migration.

Valuing what already exists

Rapid urban growth overwhelms city centres, neighbourhoods, farms, forests, landscapes, landmarks; on the other hand, urban decline leaves these resources stranded. Planners manage change while protecting what is valuable, valued, culturally precious and essential to life. What works, what doesn’t? How do we know? Which planning practices protect existing resources best?

Community and stakeholder engagement

Successful plans build on successful engagement. Securing the support of important stakeholders can be the critical step in making a plan a reality. Planners are developing new techniques and strategies to address competing interests and reduce conflict. How does planning practice for community and stakeholder engagement differ by scale, cultures, and regions? And what are the implications for teaching, learning and research?

Planners from Australia and 50 other countries are coming to Brisbane in October 2013

The most recent ISOCARP Congresses have reflected ISOCARP’s growth as a truly global network of planners, bringing together an international community of practitioners, academics, researchers, policy makers and senior urban managers in government.

The past four Congresses were held in Portugal, Kenya, China and Russia, offering delegates rewarding cross cultural perspectives while they interacted with keynote speakers, authors and presenters from all parts of the world.

Recent Congresses have addressed issues for planning at the cutting edge: growth without sprawl, low carbon cities, sustainability versus development, liveability in rapid urbanisation, and (last year) “Fast Forward”, planning in a hyper-dynamic urban context. General Rapporteur Professor Jeffrey Featherstone is bringing together an international Congress Team to present the best possible program of keynotes, papers, seminars and workshops on the frontiers of planning practice.

Brisbane has some very significant stories to tell in the fields of planning and urban governance, and the six Australian states, with their diverse but effective planning systems, offer fascinating lessons and contrasts in urban planning and governance.

I know that Congress Committee Chair Professor John Minnery and his team will make this a Congress to remember.

One of the highlights of the 2013 ISOCARP Congress

will be a day-long session presented in partnership with the Planning Institute of Australia.

The subject will be state-of-the-art planning systems around the world. Comparative examples will be drawn from the Australian states, all of which have their own mature planning systems that demonstrate both long and diverse traditions and frequent reform and innovation. An international panel will lead an interactive discussion and debate on planning systems - similarities and differences, local or universal, lessons to be learned.

With an annual city budget of \$A 2 billion (\$US 2 billion) the Brisbane City Council initiates ambitious planning projects, a number of which will be discussed during the day.

Other highlights will include over 100 technical papers, an Education Forum, workshops, seminars, special events and technical tours.

ABOUT ISOCARP

The International Society of City and Regional Planners (ISOCARP) is a global association of experienced professional planners. It was founded in 1965 in a bid to bring together recognised and highly-qualified planners in an international network. The ISOCARP network brings together individual and institutional members from more than 80 countries worldwide.

As a non-governmental organisation ISOCARP is recognised by the UN, UNHCS and the Council of Europe. The Society also has a formal consultative status with UNESCO.

The objectives of ISOCARP include the improvement of planning practice through the creation of a global and active network of practitioners. ISOCARP encourages the exchange of professional knowledge between planners, promotes the planning profession in all its forms, stimulates and improves planning research,

training and education and enhances public awareness and understanding of major planning issues at a global level.

The association's main event is the annual World Congress which focuses on a globally-significant planning theme and which takes place in a different country each year.

Prior to the congress Young Planning Professional workshops are organised. This YPP programme seeks to bring together emerging young planning professionals from all over the world to tackle 'real-world' planning projects.

ISOCARP Urban Planning Advisory teams (UPATs) assist partner organisations by offering the extensive experience and expertise of ISOCARP members to work on important local or international planning projects, programs and policy initiatives.

ABOUT BRISBANE

Brisbane is the capital of the State of Queensland, one of the six federated states in the Commonwealth of Australia. Queensland is the north-eastern quadrant of the Australian continent, mostly lying above the Tropic of Capricorn, in the subtropics and tropics. Perhaps its most famous landmark is the Great Barrier Reef. Brisbane rightly sees itself as a positive and forward-thinking city region, generous and optimistic, and describes itself as Australia's new world city.

Brisbane is a leading city in the Asia Pacific Region, ranking amongst the most liveable cities in the world and one of the Australia's fastest growing city regions. Brisbane City Council, by far the largest municipal government in Australia, has received many awards and accolades for its urban planning projects including being a finalist for the Lee Kuan Yew City Prize 2012 and one of only five cities from 62 nominations awarded a special mention for outstanding planning.

Australia is a fantastic destination for the ISOCARP Congress 2013. Popular for its many tourist attractions, remarkable wildlife and beautiful beaches, Australia delivers an intriguing contrast of vast open landscapes and sophisticated, vibrant cities – and a hundred-year tradition of energetic urban planning, urban design and metropolitan management.

The Congress is being held in a brand-new venue, Brisbane's Royal International Convention Centre, which is itself the centrepiece of an exciting urban renewal precinct. The Convention Centre has the latest technology for all aspects of conventions and exhibitions, and allows all Congress activities to be held under one roof.

The Congress venue is close to the CBD and adjacent to Brisbane's Fortitude Valley, an inner city quarter with a full choice of hotels and a vibrant night life.

Brisbane has a fabulous subtropical climate. At the time of the Congress the average minimum and maximum temperatures are 14° and 24° respectively (57°F-75°F). September is the driest month, before the wetter summer months beginning in October.

And Brisbane is easy to get to, with many premium and low-fare airlines serving the city. There are *direct connections* to many countries in the region and to major hubs including Abu Dhabi, Dubai, Beijing, Guangzhou, Hong Kong, Seoul, Taipei, Bangkok, Kuala Lumpur, Singapore, Manila, Dallas and Los Angeles, and from those hubs to every part of the globe.

The Congress website will contain useful information on travel, visas and local conditions.
